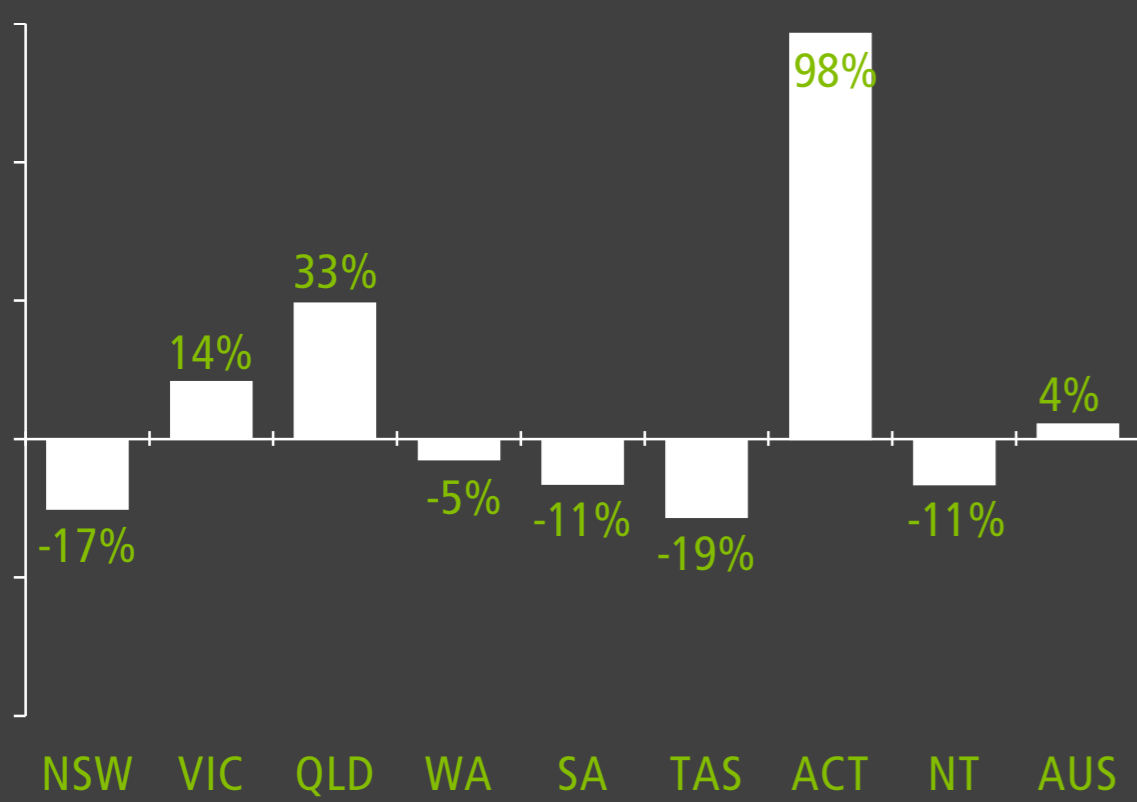
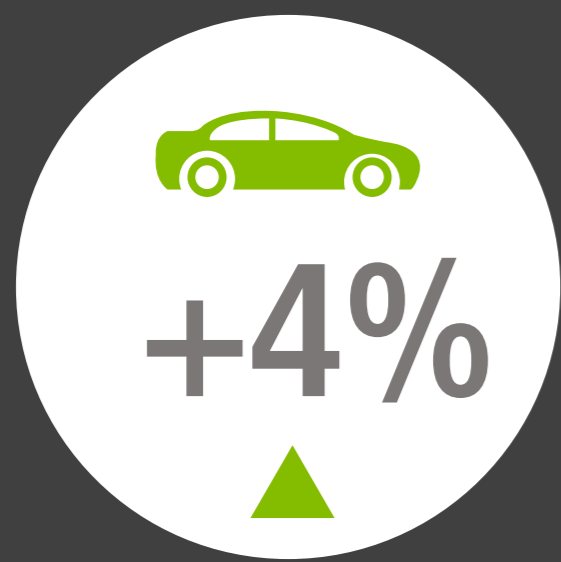

5 year proportional change in theft by vehicle type and jurisdiction:

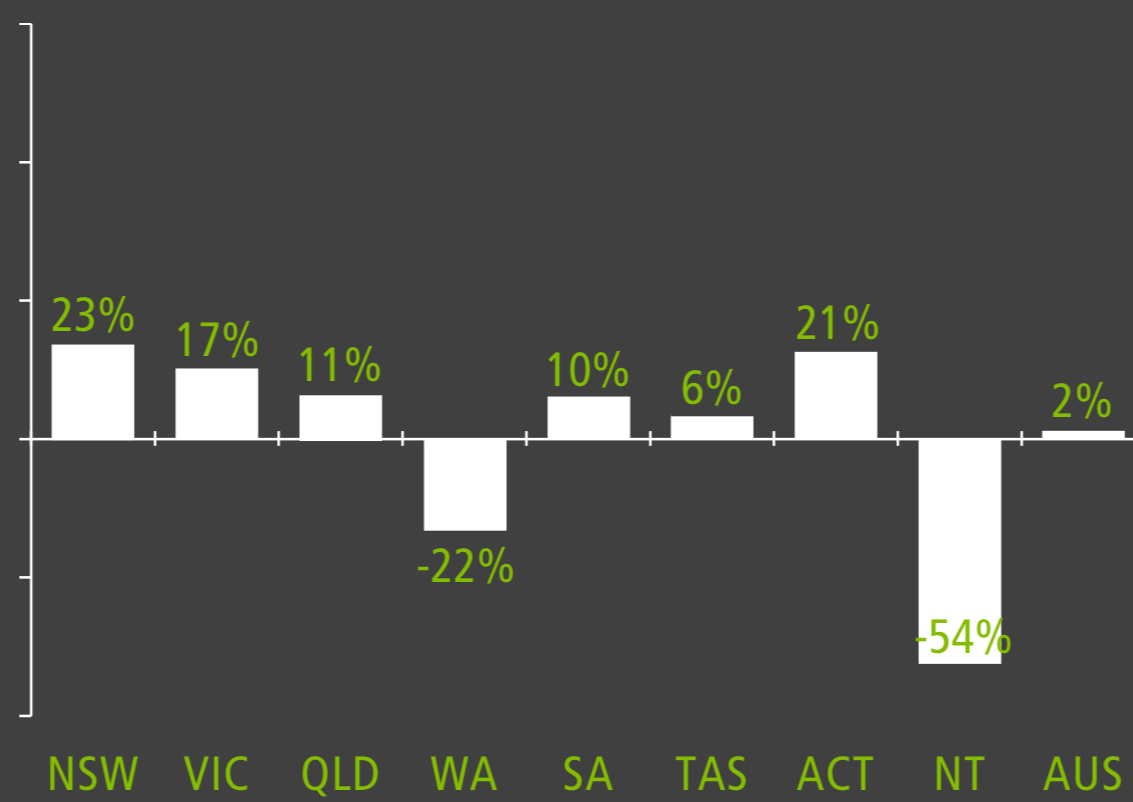
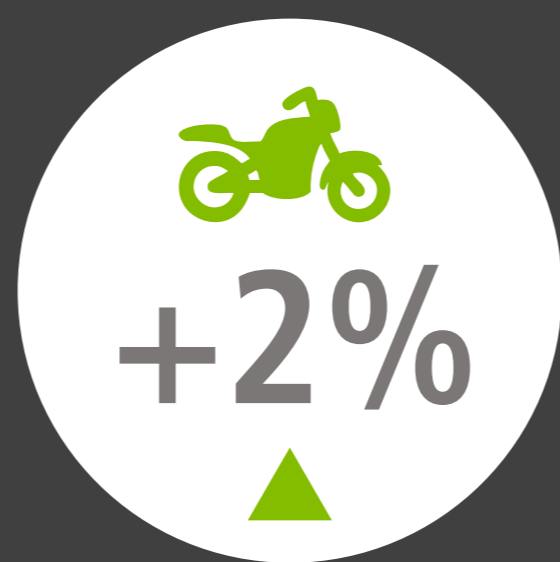
Passenger & light commercial vehicles



There have been strong five year reductions in PLC thefts in Tasmania (-19%), New South Wales (-17%), South Australia (-11%) and Northern Territory (-11%).

Increases were recorded in the Australian Capital Territory (+98%), Queensland (+33%) and Victoria (+14%).

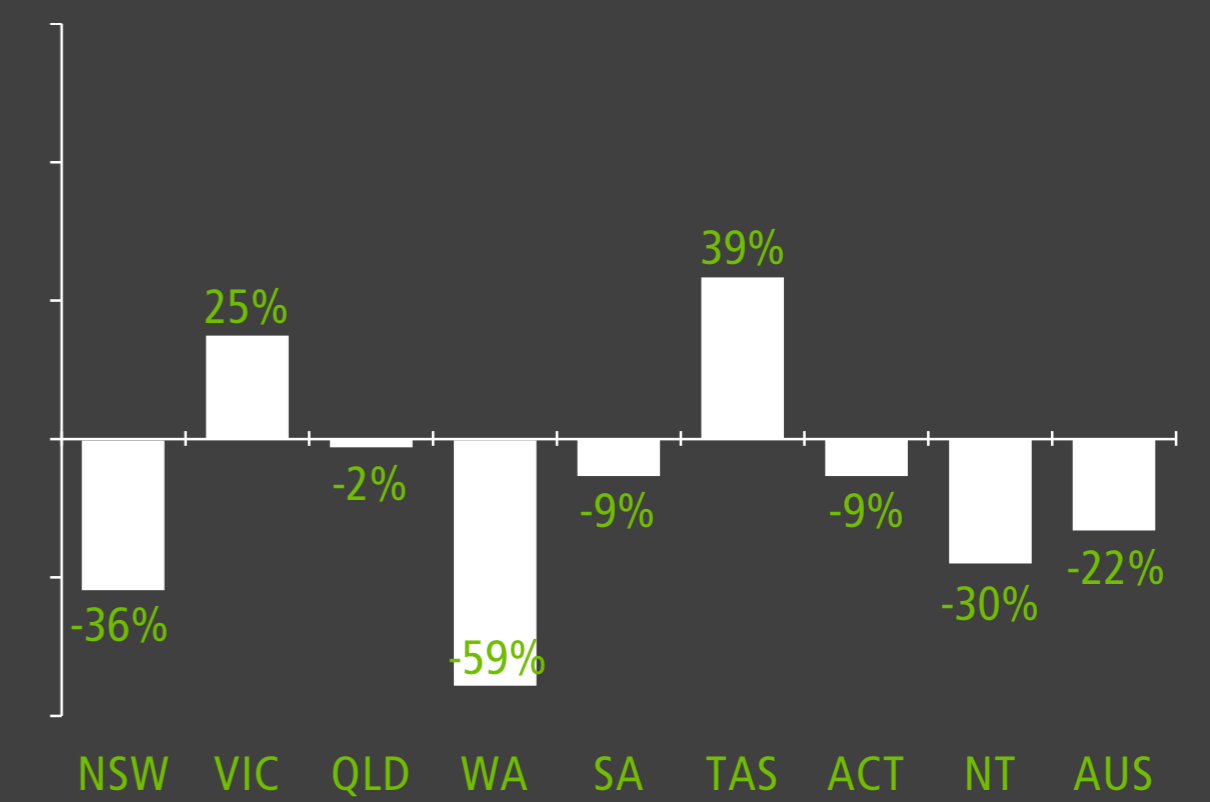
Motorcycles



Motorcycle thefts increased in most jurisdictions between 2013/14 and 2017/18. Large increases were recorded in New South Wales (+23%), the Australian Capital Territory (+21%) and Victoria (+17%).

By contrast the Northern Territory (-54%) and Western Australia (-22%) recorded large reductions.

Other vehicles



Overall 'other vehicle' thefts have reduced by 22% over the last five years with reductions in six jurisdictions including Western Australia (-59%), New South Wales (-36%) and the Northern Territory (-30%).

The only increases were recorded in Tasmania (+39%) and Victoria (+25%).



53% of motor vehicle thefts were stolen from a residential location followed by 24% from the street.



On average passenger & light commercial vehicles stolen in 2017/18 were recovered 30 kms away, which is 3 kms further than vehicles stolen in 2013/14.



Motorcycles were recovered 17 kms away from the theft location in 2017/18 compared to 30 kms for passenger & light commercial vehicles.



The estimated average vehicle value of PLCs stolen increased from \$11,019 in 2013/14 to \$12,002 in 2017/18.

Between 2013/14 and 2017/18 there was a 4% increase in PLC theft, but a 13% increase in total stolen PLC vehicle value.
